AB 245 (Portantino)	Child Development: Electronic Payments	Requires the State Controller to pay child care and development contractors by direct deposit to the account at the financial institution of the contractorsøchoosing-effective January 1, 2013. AB 419 (Mitchell)	Licensing Inspections	Requires community care facilities to be inspected annually and family child care homes biannually. Eliminates the requirement of an initial inspection for applicants of a currently or previously licensed facility. Implies the use of key indicator visits. Includes clarifying language regarding the use of research-based and evaluated visit protocols in the annual and biannual licensing inspections; requires a stakeholder group to evaluate the new licensing visit protocol process; require a 90 day visit (following acceptance of its first resident) for residential care facilities for the elderly. Makes changes in visit protocol for Residential Care Facilities for the elderly. AB 823 (Dickinson)	California Children¢s Cabinet	Establishes the Children® Cabinet of California to serve until January 1, 2019 and to consist of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, the Secretary of California Health and Human Services, the head of each agency and department that provides services for children as well as 2 members from both the Assembly and Senate. The cabinet will make recommendations to the Governor on improvements to the delivery of child and family services. Allows for the Governor to appoint additional members of the cabinet. Defines responsibilities of the cabinet, co-chairs and staff. Further outlines priorities of the cabinet for 2012 to include: developing a plan to maximize California® share of federal funds for program that support children and youth and to improve the alignment of federal, state, and local resources. The Bureau of State Audits may conduct a performance audit of the cabinet and report finding by January 1, 2018. SB 737 (Walters)	Organized Day Camps	Increases the number of hours that an ASES program may operate from 30 to 60 hours a week without being licensed as a child care facility, but that no child may be in a program for more than 30 hours per week. Exempts organized day camps for children 4 to 17 years of age that operate seasonally during times when school is not regularly in session from licensure. Further defines organized camps including programming less than 4 hours in duration, program director requirements and employee criminal record checks. Includes the YMCA as an organization that provides recreation programs that is exempt from child care licensure. Sponsor California State Alliance of YMCAs and California Collaboration for Youth. AB 884 (Cook)	Sex Offenders: Neighborhood Notification	Requires law enforcement agencies notified of the registration of a sex offender who was convicted of a sexually violent offense or a sex crime against a child under 14 years of age to provide notice to all persons living within 1,000 feet of the residence of a sex offender and to all schools and day care centers that provide services in the area where the sex offender resides. AB 1312 (Smyth)	Child Care: Exemption from Licensure: Public Recreation Programs	Increases the amount of time public recreations programs may operate without being licensed. School age & preschool programs could operate 20 hours a week or 13 weeks a year (up from 16 hours/week or 12 weeks a year for school age programs and up from 12 hours/week or 12 weeks a year for preschool programs). SB174 (Emmerson)	Community Care Licensing	Makes technical, non-substantive changes to the licensure and regulation of community care licensed facilities.	Spot Bill
SB 486 (Dutton)	First 5 Abolishment	Subject to approval by the voters, abolishes the state and county First 5 Commissions. Allocates any further revenues to the state general fund for Medi-Cal and Healthy Families programs. Allocates unencumbered funds from county commissions to county offices of education (50%) and the county (50%) and makes contracts the responsibility of the county. Transfers unencumbered funds from the state commission to the state general fund and makes contracts the responsibility of the California Secretary for Health and Human Services. SB 634 (Runner)	Transitional Kindergarten Elimination	Deletes the new requirements for providing transitional kindergarten programs and the funding for these programs while keeping the change in the kindergarten entrance age change. Prohibits a school district from offering a transitional kindergarten program unless the Department of Finance certifies that sufficient funds exist to initiate transitional kindergarten programs for all eligible children, including children of all socioeconomic statuses, English learners, and individuals with exceptional needs, without removing funding from existing state programs or services. Additionally prohibits a school district from initiating a transitional kindergarten program if the district has a qualified or negative interim financial certification.
